Quarantine Regulations & Checkpoints

Travellers should be aware of the regulations and restrictions relating to the transporting of not only fruit, but items such as fruit boxes, honey, vegetables, etc, between states – and it does vary from state to state. In fact every state in Australia has some quarantine precautions and restrictions. Being forewarned will save you the expense of handing over a great load of fruit and vegetables at a quarantine checkpoint which you may have just recently purchased.

Fruit Fly Exclusion Zone (FFEZ and Greater Sunraysia

Northern Territory

Ti Tree Fruit Fly Exclusion Zone (FFEZ) - The Ti Tree FFEZ extends from Tennant Creek to Alice Springs. Do not take fruit (including capsicum, chilli, tomato, eggplant, cucumber, zucchini and squash) into the FFEZ - www.interstatequarantine.org.au/travellers/.

In Cape York, just north of Coen, a quarantine checkpoint is manned to stop the spread of a number of exotic diseases, including the mango leaf hopper and the red banded mango caterpillar. There are generally no restrictions on root and leafy vegetables. It is illegal to carry fruit and vegetables across all borders into South Australia, unless they have been certified free of pests and diseases.

South Australian Quarantine roadblocks and honesty bins are strategically placed throughout South Australia. Mobile quarantine roadblocks operate on country roads.

From the PIRSA web site you can look at the SA fruit fly map. This interactive map displays the locations of Quarantine Stations, Quarantine Bins and the *Riverland Pest Free Area*

Quarantine Station Checkpoints are located on the:

Sturt Highway at Yamba between Mildura and Renmark

Eyre Highway at **Ceduna** – for travellers coming in from Western Australia Barrier Highway at **Oodla Wirra**

Mallee Highway between Murrayville and Pinnaroo

Plant and animal quarantine examinations are conducted at all points of entry into Tasmania. 'On the spot' fines apply for both commercial and non-commercial imports.

Quarantine Checkpoints include:

Eucla – The WA/SA border on the Eyre Highway has **very** stringent quarantine regulations for travellers entering WA. Travellers planning to head south or north before reaching Norseman, where you can purchase supplies, will need to plan their food supplies well. You cannot carry any fresh or dried fruit, vegetables, or honey.

Kununurra – in far north of WA at the NT/WA border, on Highway 1 (Victoria Highway), also has very strict quarantine regulations. For further information and current regulations contact the *WA/NT Checkpoint*, ph: (08) 9168 7354.

Movement of plant products into and/or out of the following zones is regulated:

Ord River Irrigation Area – Uncertified citrus and stone fruit are prohibited entry into the Ord River Irrigation Area (Kununurra) from 1 April to 30 November. Check other fruit you are carrying, to reduce the risk of introducing fruit fly.

Kimberley region –The entry or taking delivery of hosts of the pest silverleaf whitefly is prohibited into the Shires of Broome and Wyndham East Kimberley from parts of Western Australia outside the Kimberley region, unless certified by Quarantine WA.
